Bill 04-1281** - An Ordinance concerning - Urban Renewal - Washington Hill - Chapel - Amendment 11 - For the purpose of amending the Urban Renewal Plan for Washington Hill - Chapel to change the land use category for ~~11-31~~ 11/23, 25, 27, 29, and 31 Yogurt Lane and 1704, 1706/12, ~~1712, 1714, and 1716, and 1718~~ East Lombard Street and to revise Exhibit 1 to reflect the change; waiving certain content and procedural requirements; making the provisions of this Ordinance severable; providing for the application of this Ordinance in conjunction with certain other ordinances; and providing for a special effective date.

Bill 04-1327 - An Ordinance concerning - Bond Issue - Walters Art Museum Loan - \$500,000 - For the purpose of authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore (pursuant to Resolution XII of 2004 approved by the members of the General Assembly of Maryland representing Baltimore City) to issue and sell its certificates of indebtedness in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$500,000, the proceeds derived from the sale thereof to be used for the cost of issuance, including the expense of engraving, printing, advertising, attorneys' fees, and all other incidental expenses connected therewith, and the remainder of such proceeds to be used for the acquisition, by purchase, condemnation, or any other legal means, of land or property, or any rights therein, in the City of Baltimore, and for constructing and erecting, on said land or property, or on any land or property, new buildings, structures and other auxiliary facilities, and for the renovation, alternation, construction, reconstruction, installation, improvement and repair of existing buildings, structures and facilities to be or now being used in connection with the operations, functions, and activities of the Walters Art Museum; and to equip all facilities authorized to be constructed, renovated, altered or improved by the provisions hereof; the payment of any and all costs and expenses incurred for or in connection with doing any or all of the things herein mentioned, including, but not limited to, the costs and expenses of securing administrative, appraisal, economic analysis, engineering, planning, designing, architectural, surveying, and other professional services; and for doing any and all things necessary, proper or expedient in connection with or pertaining to any or all of the matters or things hereinbefore mentioned; authorizing the issuance of refunding bonds; conferring and imposing upon the Board of Finance of Baltimore City certain powers and duties; authorizing the submission of this Ordinance to the legal voters of the City of Baltimore, for their approval or disapproval, at the election to be held in Baltimore City on Tuesday, the 2nd day of November, 2004; and providing for the expenditure of the proceeds of sale of said certificates of indebtedness in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, and by the municipal agency or other entity designated in the annual Ordinance of Estimates of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore.

C.C. Bill 04-1338 - An Ordinance concerning - Sale of Property - Cardiff Avenue and a 19-foot Alley - For the purpose of authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in certain parcels of land known as the former bed of (1) Cardiff Avenue, extending from Baylis Street westerly to Highland Avenue, (2) Cardiff Avenue, extending from Highland Avenue westerly to Clinton Street, and (3) a 19-

foot alley laid out in the rear of the properties known as Nos. 1501/05 through 1555 South Clinton Street, extending from Cardiff Avenue southerly to the end thereof and no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

C.C. Bill 03-1064 - An Ordinance concerning - Solid Waste Haulers - Scrap Metal Processors - For the purpose of exempting from the regulations governing solid waste collection certain scrap metal processors under certain conditions; and generally related to scrap metal processors and solid waste collection.

C.C. Bill 03-1084 - An Ordinance concerning - East Baltimore Research Park - Development District - For the purpose of designating a “development district” to be known as the “East Baltimore Research Park Development District”; providing for and determining various matters in connection with the establishment of the development district; creating a special, tax increment fund for the development district; allocating certain property taxes to that fund; making certain findings and determinations; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the designation and operation of the development district, the establishment and use of the tax increment fund, and the ~~issuance and payment of special obligation bonds issued~~ payment of notes or other debt instruments delivered in connection with the development district.

C.C. Bill 03-1135 - An Ordinance concerning - Transfer Tax - Taxable Basis - For the purpose of redefining, to conform to changes in State law, the taxable basis to be used in assessing the City transfer tax; clarifying, correcting, and conforming certain language; and generally relating to the transfer tax imposed on transfers of property or interests in property.

C.C. Bill 03-1248 - An Ordinance concerning - Baltimore City Landmark List - First English Lutheran Church - For the purpose of designating First English Lutheran Church, 3807 North Charles Street, as a historical landmark.

C.C. Bill 04-1263 - An Ordinance concerning - Planned Unit Development - Designation - 1800 East Fort Avenue and 1700 Beason Street - For the purpose of approving the application of Silo Point II, LLC, owner of 1800 East Fort Avenue and 1700 Beason Street (collectively, the “Property”), to have that Property designated ~~an Industrial~~ a Residential Planned Unit Development; and approving the Development Plan submitted by the applicant.

C.C. Bill 04-1268 - An Ordinance concerning - Zoning – Restaurants – Outdoor Table Service - For the purpose of authorizing in the B-1 District, as a conditional use requiring Board approval, outdoor table service when accessory to a restaurant use; clarifying the status of this accessory use in other districts; and generally relating to table service that is accessory to a restaurant use.

C.C. Bill 04-1275 - An Ordinance concerning - Baltimore City Landmark List - Cherry Hill Elementary School #159 - For the purpose of designating Cherry Hill Elementary School #159, 801 Bridgeview Road, as a historical landmark.

C.C. Bill 04-1309 - An Ordinance concerning - Rezoning -- 1800 East Fort Avenue and 1700 Beason Street - For the purpose of changing the zoning for the property known as 1800 East Fort Avenue and a portion of the property known as 1700 Beason Street, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the M-3 Zoning District to the R-8 Zoning District, and for changing the zoning for a portion of the property known as 1700 Beason Street, as outlined in blue on the accompanying plat, from the M-2-2 Zoning District to the R-8 Zoning District.

C.C. Bill 04-1311 - A Resolution of the Mayor and City Council concerning - Charter Amendment – City Council – Age Requirements - For the purpose of lowering the minimum age requirement for members of the City Council; and submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of the City for adoption or rejection.

C.C. Bill 04-1318 - An Ordinance concerning - Bond Issue - Community Development Loan - \$33,500,000 - For the purpose of authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore (pursuant to Resolution VI of 2004 approved by the members of the General Assembly of Maryland representing Baltimore City) to issue and sell its certificates of indebtedness in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$33,500,000, the proceeds derived from the sale thereof to be used for the cost of issuance, including the expense of engraving, printing, advertising, attorneys' fees, and all other incidental expenses connected therewith, and the remainder of such proceeds to be used for or in connection with planning, developing, executing, and making operative the community development program of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, including, but not limited to, the acquisition, by purchase, lease, condemnation or any other legal means, of land or property, or any right, interest, franchise, easement or privilege therein, in the City of Baltimore; the payment of any and all costs and expenses incurred in connection with or incidental to the acquisition and management of said land or property, including any and all rights or interest therein hereinbefore mentioned; the payment of any and all costs and expenses incurred for or in connection with relocating and moving persons or other legal entities displaced by the acquisition of said land or property, or any of the rights or interest therein hereinbefore mentioned; the development, or redevelopment, including, but not limited to, the comprehensive renovation or rehabilitation of any land or property, or any rights or interests therein hereinbefore mentioned, in the City of Baltimore, and the disposition of land and property for such purposes; the elimination of unhealthful, unsanitary or unsafe conditions, lessening density, eliminating obsolete or other uses detrimental to the public welfare or otherwise removing or preventing the spread of blight or deterioration in the City of Baltimore; the demolition, removal, relocation, renovation or alteration of land, buildings, streets, highways, alleys, utilities or services, and other structures or improvements, and for the construction, reconstruction, installation, relocation or repair of buildings, streets, highways, alleys, utilities or services, and other structures or improvements; the payment of any and all costs and expenses incurred for or in connection with doing any or all of the things herein mentioned, including, but not limited to, the costs and expenses of securing administrative, appraisal, economic analysis, engineering, planning, designing, architectural, surveying, and other professional services; and for doing any and all things necessary, proper or expedient in connection with or pertaining to any or all of the matters or things hereinbefore mentioned; authorizing the issuance of refunding

bonds; conferring and imposing upon the Board of Finance of Baltimore City certain powers and duties; authorizing the submission of this Ordinance to the legal voters of the City of Baltimore, for their approval or disapproval, at the General Election to be held in Baltimore City on Tuesday, the 2nd day of November, 2004; and providing for the expenditure of the proceeds of sale of said certificates of indebtedness in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, and by the municipal agency designated in the annual Ordinance of Estimates of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore.

Bill 04-1319 - An Ordinance concerning - Bond Issue - Economic Development Loan - \$29,875,000 - For the purpose of authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore (pursuant to Resolution III of 2002 approved by the members of the General Assembly of Maryland representing Baltimore City) to issue and sell its certificates of indebtedness in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$29,875,000 the proceeds derived from the sale thereof to be used for the cost of issuance, including the expense of engraving, printing, advertising, attorneys' fees, and all other incidental expenses connected therewith, and the remainder of such proceeds to be used for or in connection with planning, developing, executing, and making operative the commercial and industrial economic development program of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, including, but not limited to, the acquisition, by purchase, lease, condemnation or any other legal means, of land or property, or any right, interest, franchise, easement or privilege therein, in the City of Baltimore; the payment of any and all costs and expenses incurred in connection with or incidental to the acquisition and management of said land or property, including any and all rights or interests therein hereinbefore mentioned; the payment of any and all costs and expenses incurred for or in connection with relocating and moving persons or other legal entities displaced by the acquisition of said land or property, or any of the rights or interests therein hereinbefore mentioned; the development, or redevelopment, including, but not limited to, the comprehensive renovation or rehabilitation of any land or property, or any rights or interests therein hereinbefore mentioned, in the City of Baltimore, and the disposition of land and property for such purposes; the elimination of unhealthful, unsanitary or unsafe conditions, lessening density, eliminating obsolete or other uses detrimental to the public welfare or otherwise removing or preventing the spread of blight or deterioration in the City of Baltimore; the demolition, removal, relocation, renovation or alteration of land, buildings, streets, highways, alleys, utilities or services, and other structures or improvements, and for the construction, reconstruction, installation, relocation or repair of buildings, streets, highways, alleys, utilities or services, and other structures or improvements; the payment of any and all costs and expenses incurred for or in connection with doing any or all of the things herein mentioned, including, but not limited to, the costs and expenses of securing administrative, appraisal, economic analysis, engineering, planning, designing, architectural, surveying, and other professional services; authorizing the making of loans and grants to persons and other legal entities; and for doing any and all things necessary, proper or expedient in connection with or pertaining to any or all of the matters or things hereinbefore mentioned; authorizing the issuance of refunding bonds; conferring and imposing upon the Board of Finance of Baltimore City certain powers and duties; authorizing the submission of this Ordinance to the legal voters of the City of Baltimore, for their approval or disapproval,

at the General Election to be held in Baltimore City on Tuesday, the 2nd day of November, 2004; and providing for the expenditure of the proceeds of sale of said certificates of indebtedness in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, and by the municipal agency designated in the annual Ordinance of Estimates of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore.

In the last 40 years, CHAP has done much to help improve the City of Baltimore. CHAP approves 250-300 permits a year for rehabilitation work on locally designated property, provides design review and technical services to 27 historic districts, comprising some 8,000 properties. CHAP has restored many Baltimore City monuments including the Francis Scott Key Monument (Eutaw Place), and it administers Baltimore City's Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credit, which has supported 332 projects that generated \$151 million in investments to date.

CHAP has also coordinated the designation of new landmarks, and it continues to promote legacy of Edgar Allan Poe in Baltimore local literacy heritage by receiving 5,000 visitors at the Edgar Allan Poe House Museum and Poe House events.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING

Charter Schools – Why Limit Our Children?

FOR the purpose of requesting that the members of the School Board explain to the Council their decision to limit the number of charter schools in the Baltimore City before conducting the proper financial and educational research to do so.

Recitals

Charter schools are nonsectarian public schools of choice that operate with freedom from many of the regulations that apply to traditional public schools. The "charter" establishing each school is a performance contract detailing the school's mission, program, goals, students served, methods of assessment, and ways to measure success. The length of time for which charters are granted varies, but most are granted for 3-5 years. At the end of the term, the entity granting the charter may renew the school's contract. Charter schools are accountable to their sponsor – usually a state or local school board – to produce positive academic results and adhere to the charter contract. The basic concept of charter schools is that they exercise increased autonomy in return for this accountability. They are accountable for both academic results and fiscal practices to several groups: the sponsor that grants them; the parents who choose them; and the public that funds them.

The intention of most charter school legislation is to increase opportunities for learning and access to quality education for all students, create choice for parents and students within the public school system, provide a system of accountability for results in public education, encourage innovative teaching practices, create new professional opportunities for teachers, and encourage community and parent involvement in public education.

People establish charter schools for a variety of reasons. The founders generally fall into 3 groups: grassroots organizations of parents, teachers and community members; entrepreneurs; or existing schools converting to charter status. According to the first-year report of the National Study of Charter Schools, the 3 reasons most often cited to create a charter school are to realize an educational vision, gain autonomy, and serve a special population.

Parents and teachers choose charter schools primarily for educational reasons – high academic standards, small class size, innovative approaches, or educational philosophies in line with their own. Some also have chosen charter schools for their small size and associated safety (charter schools serve an average of 250 students).

The charter school movement has roots in a number of other reform ideas, from alternative schools, to site-based management, magnet schools, public school choice, privatization, and community-parental empowerment. The term "charter" may have originated in the 1970s, when New England educator Ray Budde suggested that small groups of teachers be given contracts or "charters" by their local school boards to explore new approaches. Albert Shanker, former president of the AFT, then publicized the idea, suggesting that local boards could charter an entire school with union and teacher approval. In the late 1980s, Philadelphia started a number of schools-within-schools and called them "charters." Some of them were schools of choice. The idea was further refined in Minnesota where charter schools were developed according to 3 basic values: opportunity; choice; and responsibility for results.

In 1991, Minnesota passed the first charter school law, with California following suit in 1992. By 1995, 19 states had signed laws allowing for the creation of charter schools, and by 2003, that number increased to 40 states, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia. Charter schools are one of the fastest growing innovations in education policy, enjoying broad bipartisan support from governors, state legislators, and past and present secretaries of education. In his 1997 State of the Union Address, former President Clinton called for the creation of 3,000 charter schools by the year 2002. In 2002, President Bush called for \$200 million to support charter schools. His proposed budget called for another \$100 million for a new Credit Enhancement for Charter Schools Facilities Program. Since 1994, the U.S. Department of Education has provided grants to support states' charter school efforts, starting with \$6 million in fiscal year 1995.

Charter school laws vary from state to state. While these laws often contain very similar sets of goals and purposes, there are usually important differences that need to be understood when considering establishing a charter school in a specific state and school district.

Maryland's Public Charter School Law is explicit in stating that a charter school is a public school. Accordingly, a careful review of the law will illustrate that the law contemplates the development of an effective relationship between the applicant seeking to create a public charter school and local school system in its role as the designated chartering authority. Maryland's law emphasizes a focus on innovation and student achievement and in so doing places a premium on the relationship between the school system and the public charter school applicant.

Maryland's Public Charter School Law provides an opportunity for a local school system and the public charter school leadership to create new, exciting, and innovative education programs to meet the needs of students and communities. In some instances, the law identifies waivers of state and local requirements as the mechanism for achieving flexibility consistent with the education design of the proposed public charter school.

The public charter school represents a choice for parents and may provide innovative learning opportunities and creative educational approaches to improve the education of students. Public charter schools strive for high academic standards and are accountable for results for student performance as are other public schools. Limiting the number of charter schools will not only hinder students from getting the best education that the public schools system has to offer, but will also create a situation where less funding will be available from federal grants for the public school system.
