FOR the purpose of providing that certain neighborhood associations to be given notice and an opportunity to present their recommendations for candidates to fill a vacancy in the City Council; and generally relating to the procedures for filling these vacancies.

BY readopting, without *{sic}* amendments

Rules 5-11(c)

Rules of the City Council

(2004 - 2007 Council Session)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the Rules of the City Council read as follows:

Chapter 5. Councilmembers

Rule 5-11. Vacancy.

(c) *Public hearing.*

- (1) The Nominating Committee must hold a public hearing to interview applicants for the vacant seat.
- (2) IN CASE OF A VACANCY WITHIN A CITY COUNCIL DISTRICT, THE HEARING MUST PROVIDE AN OPPORTUNITY FOR NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATIONS IN THAT DISTRICT TO PRESENT THEIR RECOMMENDATIONS FOR CANDIDATES TO FILL THE VACANCY. ALL NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATIONS IN THAT DISTRICT (AS RECOGNIZED BY THE PLANNING DEPARTMENT) MUST BE NOTIFIED AT LEAST 7 DAYS BEFORE THE HEARING OF THEIR RIGHT TO BE HEARD AND OF THE DATE, TIME, AND LOCATION OF THE HEARING.
- (3) [(2)] The hearing must be held within 30 days after the vacancy occurs.
- (4) [(3)] Public notice of the hearing must be given at least 7 days before it is held.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That these amendments take effect on the date that they are adopted.

INTRODUCTION AND READ FIRST TIME

The President laid before the City Council the following bills and Resolutions of the Mayor and City Council for first reading:

Bill No. 06-0551 - By President Dixon (The Administration):

An Ordinance amending the Urban Renewal Plan for Canton Waterfront to revise certain height restrictions; waiving certain content and procedural requirements; making the provisions of this Ordinance severable; providing for the application of this Ordinance in conjunction with certain other ordinances; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Public Works, Baltimore Development Corporation, Baltimore City Parking Authority Board, Department of Transportation, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 06-0552 - By President Dixon (The Administration):

An Ordinance approving certain amendments to the Development Plan of the Lighthouse Point Planned Unit Development.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Public Works, Fire Department, Baltimore Development Corporation, Baltimore City Parking Authority Board, Department of Transportation, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 06-0553 - By President Dixon (The Administration):

A Resolution of the Mayor and City Council renewing and continuing the Downtown Management District and Downtown Management Authority, subject to certain conditions, for an additional 5 years; generally relating to the activities and authority of the Downtown Management District and Downtown Management Authority; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, City Solicitor, Planning Commission, Fire Department, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Public Works, Department of Housing and Community Development, Board of Estimates, Urban Affairs Committee.

Bill No. 06-0554 - By Councilmember Young (by request):

An Ordinance permitting, subject to certain conditions, the establishment, maintenance, and operation of parking, open off-street area on the property known as 1600 North Dallas Street, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Transportation, Fire Department, Baltimore City Parking Authority Board, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 06-0555 - By Councilmember Young (by request):

An Ordinance permitting, subject to certain conditions, the establishment, maintenance, and operation of a parking, open off-street area on the property known as 1601 North Dallas Street, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Transportation, Fire Department, Baltimore City Parking Authority Board, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 06-0556 - By Councilmember Rawlings Blake:

An Ordinance expanding the definition of “youth” for certain purposes; and generally relating to the Office of Children, Youth, and Families and the Baltimore City Youth Commission.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Mayor’s Office of Children, Youth, and Families, Youth Commission, Judiciary and Legislative Investigations Committee.

Bill No. 06-0557 - By Councilmember Conaway (by request):

An Ordinance amending Ordinance 03-488 to expand the boundaries of the home for homeless persons at 1930 and 1932 West North Avenue to add 1928 West North Avenue, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Transportation, Fire Department, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 06-0558 - By Councilmembers Young, Clarke, Holton, Branch, Reisinger, Rawlings Blake, Conaway, Curran, Harris, Kraft, D’Adamo, Welch, Mitchell:

An Ordinance requiring certain residential projects to provide units at affordable ownership costs or affordable rents; defining certain terms; authorizing certain modifications, waivers, or substitutions under certain circumstances; providing for certain cost-offsets for certain purposes; setting certain standards for affordable units; granting the Housing Commissioner and certain designated housing providers right of first refusal to purchase or rent certain units; requiring the continued affordability of units for a certain period; establishing an Inclusionary Housing Board and providing for its powers and duties; authorizing the Board, the Housing Commissioner, and the Planning Commission to adopt certain rules and regulations; establishing an Inclusionary Housing Trust Fund for certain purposes and providing for its governance; establishing an inclusionary-housing property-tax credit, contingent on enactment of State enabling legislation; authorizing certain adjustments to lot area per dwelling requirements; establishing an Inclusionary Housing Overlay Zoning District for certain rezoned properties; providing for certain special effective dates; and generally relating to the promotion of affordable residential units.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Finance, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

The President laid before the City Council the following Council Resolutions for first reading:

Bill No. 06-0237R - By Councilmembers Conaway, Kraft, Young, Harris, Mitchell, Reisinger, Clarke, Welch, D’Adamo:

A Resolution requesting that the City of Baltimore develop a pilot program to keep certain schools in Baltimore City open on weekends and during the summer, in order to provide young

people who otherwise would be on the streets and potentially breaking curfew, with a safe place to have activities on the weekends and during the summer months.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Department of Finance, Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners, Baltimore City Public School System, Education, Housing, Health, and Human Services Committee.

Bill No. 06-0238R - By Councilmembers Holton, Young, Rawlings Blake, Kraft:

A Resolution requesting the Health Commissioner to appoint a member of his staff to serve as the Baltimore City Health and Fitness Coordinator to work with private, corporate, and community organizations, public and private schools, communities of faith, hospitals, health systems, health clubs and gyms, pharmaceuticals, medical outlets, local, state and federal government agencies, non-profit health agencies, and sports teams to form a coalition to promote healthy living and fitness and to combat preventable disease and illness that threaten the lives of our adults and that threaten to detrimentally impact the quality of life and shorten the expected life span of our young people; and to require the Coordinator to develop a system to provide a single point of entry for Baltimore residents seeking information about how to access governmental and private industry fitness and healthy living services.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Health Department, Education, Housing, Health, and Human Services Committee.

Bill No. 06-0239R - By Councilmembers Mitchell, Harris, Branch, Reisinger, Clarke, Curran, Kraft, Holton:

A Resolution establishing the Baltimore City Tax and Fee Structure Task Force to study and examine the application and use of Baltimore City's tax structure and fee system.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING

Request for State Legislation – Registration of Homeless Sex Offenders

FOR the purpose of requesting the Honorable Chairs and Members of the Baltimore City Senate and House Delegations to the 2007 Maryland General Assembly to introduce legislation to amend Maryland's sex offender registration law to provide for the registration of homeless persons convicted of sex offenses, in a manner that enables law enforcement officials and members of the general public to know when these sex offenders are present in communities

throughout the State; urging the Honorable Chairs and Members of the Senate Judicial Proceedings and House Judiciary Committees to give the bills favorable consideration; and, should both Houses of the legislature report the measures favorably, calling upon the Governor to sign the bills into law.

Recitals

In Baltimore City the June stabbing death of an 11 year old boy at the hands of a 41 year old convicted sex offender, in what was supposed to be the sunny, care-free, fun-filled days of a child's summer respite from the rigors of the classroom, tragically underscored the horror these predators can visit upon innocent children and the feelings of insecurity and fear for the safety of loved ones the heinous crimes perpetrated by sex offenders can visit upon an entire city.

In October, news that the child's mother had been arrested and charged with reckless endangerment and 4 counts of criminal neglect for allowing the registered sex offender access to her children rubbed raw an emotional wound that had just begun to heal. In November, news reports that Maryland's high court has ruled that homeless sex offenders are exempt from laws requiring registration of a change of address has returned Baltimore's communities to the feelings of fearful vulnerability experienced this past June.

The Maryland Court of Appeals rulings that returned the specter of the sexual predator offender to the forefront of the minds of Maryland residents overturned the convictions of 2 sex offenders in Montgomery County for failure to update their addresses. The public defender for 1 of the men whose argument was upheld by the court contended that it is impossible for the homeless to comply with the registry law requiring registrants to notify authorities when they move.

Other states, either foreseeing this possible loophole or tailoring their statutes retroactively, have addressed the problems inherent in the registration of the whereabouts of homeless offenders. In Washington State, the law pertaining to sex offenders provides:

- (vii) OFFENDERS WHO LACK A FIXED RESIDENCE. Any person who lacks a fixed residence and leaves the county in which he or she is registered and enters and remains within a new county for twenty-four hours is required to register with the county sheriff not more than twenty-four hours after entering the county and provide the information required in subsection (3)(b) of this section.
- (viii) OFFENDERS WHO LACK A FIXED RESIDENCE AND WHO ARE UNDER SUPERVISION. Offenders who lack a fixed residence and who are under supervision of the department shall register in the county of their supervision.

California's penal code provides as follows:

- (i) A transient must register, or reregister if the person has previously registered, within five working days from release from incarceration, placement or commitment, or release on probation, pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (a), except that if the person previously registered as a transient less than 30 days from the date of his or her release from incarceration, he or she does not need to reregister as a transient until

his or her next required 30-day update of registration. If a transient is not physically present in any one jurisdiction for five consecutive working days, he or she must register in the jurisdiction in which he or she is physically present on the fifth working day following release, pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (a). Beginning on or before the 30th day following initial registration upon release, a transient must reregister no less than once every 30 days thereafter. A transient shall register with the chief of police of the city in which he or she is physically present within that 30-day period, or the sheriff of the county if he or she is physically present in an unincorporated area or city that has no police department, and additionally, with the chief of police of a campus of the University of California, the California State University, or community college if he or she is physically present upon the campus or in any of its facilities. A transient must reregister no less than once every 30 days regardless of the length of time he or she has been physically present in the particular jurisdiction in which he or she reregisters. If a transient fails to reregister within any 30-day period, he or she may be prosecuted in any jurisdiction in which he or she is physically present.

- (ii) A transient who moves to a residence shall have five working days within which to register at that address, in accordance with subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (a). A person registered at a residence address in accordance with subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (a), who becomes transient shall have five working days within which to reregister as a transient in accordance with clause (I).
- (iii) Beginning on his or her first birthday following registration, a transient shall register annually, within five working days of his or her birthday, to update his or her registration with the entities described in clause (i). A transient shall register in whichever jurisdiction he or she is physically present on that date. At the 30-day updates and the annual update, a transient shall provide current information as required on the Department of Justice annual update form, including the information described in subparagraphs (A) to (C), inclusive, of paragraph (2) of subdivision (e), and the information specified in clause (iv).
- (iv) A transient shall, upon registration and reregistration, provide current information as required on the Department of Justice registration forms, and shall also list the places where he or she sleeps, eats, works, frequents, and engages in leisure activities. If a transient changes or adds to the places listed on the form during the 30-day period, he or she does not need to report the new place or places until the next required reregistration.

In order to force out-of-state and homeless sex offenders to register, New Mexico requires, since 2005, that anyone who has been convicted of a sex offense in any court - including federal, military, or tribal - must register his or her location within 10 days of arriving in New Mexico. The law covers locations in temporary shelters such as halfway houses, rehabs, ditches, or cardboard boxes. If the offenders leave these locations, they have 10 days to give their new ones.

The Bureau of Justice Statistics has found that compared with other type of offenders released from state prisons, released sex offenders are 4 times as likely to be rearrested for a sex

crime. There are a reported 4,495 registered sex offenders in Maryland, 1,070 of whom lived in Baltimore in January 2006, – 765 child sex offenders and 275 sexually violent sex offenders. We cannot take the risk of allowing any of these monsters to anonymously prowl our communities in search of ingenuous prey.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the Honorable Chairs and Members of the Baltimore City Senate and House Delegations to the 2007 Maryland General Assembly are requested to introduce legislation to amend Maryland's sex offender registration law to provide for the registration of homeless persons convicted of sex offenses, in a manner that enables law enforcement officials and members of the general public to know when these sex offenders are present in communities throughout the state; the Honorable Chairs and Members of the Senate Judicial Proceedings and House Judiciary Committees are urged to give the bills favorable consideration; and, should both Houses of the legislature report the measures favorably, the Governor is fervently called upon to sign the bill into law.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Resolution be forwarded to the Honorable Chairs and Members of the Senate and House Delegations to the Maryland General Assembly following the convening of the 2007 Session on January 10, 2007.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor, the Governor, the Honorable Chairs and Members of the Baltimore City Senate and House Delegations to the 2007 Maryland General Assembly, the Chairs and Members of the Senate Judicial Proceedings and House Judiciary Committees, the Executive Director of the Mayor's Office of State Relations, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.
